We are now more than 900 members strong, and growing. APM members are expanding the evidence base of our field, training the next generation of Psychosomatic Medicine specialists, and providing excellent care to patients with concurrent medical and psychiatric illness.

I hope all of you were able to attend last year's APM Annual Meeting in Marco Island, Florida. If you did, I am sure you'll agree with me that it was a great gathering with outstanding plenaries, symposia, workshops, pre-conference courses, and presentations of original research. Last year's program chair **Linda Worley**, last year's president **David Gitlin**, and the Annual Meeting Committee constructed an outstanding meeting—the highlight of the APM year. A special thanks to APM's executive director Norman Wallis, Kristen Flemming, and the rest of the staff at PAI Management Corporation for all their hard work in organizing the Annual Meeting, as well as all the support they provide APM throughout the year.

We started the new year with a new publisher for our journal, *Psychosomatics*. By now, you should have received your first issue published by Elsevier, sporting a new look inside and out. The leadership of your Academy is excited about our new partnership with Elsevier, and under Editor-in-Chief **Ted Stern's** leadership, *Psychosomatics* is poised to continue along its trajectory of strong growth. The future is bright for our journal.

The APM Council has determined that this is the time to formally revisit our strategic plan. At the Council's mid-year meeting in June, we'll hold a strategic planning retreat, aimed at mapping out the Academy's growth for the next several years. We have retained a professional consultant and facilitator who will be working in concert with the APM Council to prepare for our working time together in June. You'll hear much more about the outcomes of this process as the work progresses, but in the meantime, any members who have thoughts or ideas about the strategic priorities of the Academy are welcome to submit comments to me, **Wayne Katon**, chair of the Strategic Planning Committee, Norman Wallis, APM's executive director, or any member of the APM Council.

Another priority project for the year is advancement of a Maintenance of Certification (MOC) process, in partnership with the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. APM committees, including the Education and Clinical Practice committees, have already been working hard producing materials and content that both enhance the value of membership and can enhance the teaching, learning, and practice of psychosomatic medicine. As you know, along with certification in psychosomatic medicine comes the need for formal re-certification, and a working group, led by **Bob Boland**, is in the process of developing plans and proposals for that process. You'll hear more about this project in the months to come.

New Online MEMBER MANAGEMENT SYSTEM and New Login to Members' Corner

APM has invested in a major upgrade to the computer software we use for managing our membership, conferences, committees, sales—in fact all aspects of APM. This investment will provide faster and more complete service for you as well as for the Academy office.

The first major benefit is **online membership renewal for 2011**. In the past, APM mailed renewal notices for you to complete and return by mail or fax for processing. Renewal invoices were again mailed in January for 2011, but now you can renew your membership online and download a receipt instantly, similar to your experience with retailers, hotels, and airlines. If you have reservations about paying online, you can print your invoice and complete the credit card details and either fax the form to the office at (301) 656-0989 or mail the form with a check.

To accommodate this upgrade, your renewal invoice should have come with your personal, unique login to the APM Members' Corner on the Web site. Your login username is your email address; your password was issued with a default password, and we encourage you to change your password as soon as convenient to protect your identity on the site. Your login allows you to not just renew your membership, but to also **change your membership profile** (including your password) and to give you **access to the new *Psychosomatics* Web site** without having to log in separately for the journal.

Please note that if we do not have your email address, you will not be able to log in!!! AWARDS

HACKETT AWARD

The Eleanor and Thomas P. Hackett Memorial Award is the Academy's highest honor, given in recognition of outstanding achievement across an entire career in psychosomatic medicine. This year's award was presented to **Donna E. Stewart, MD, FAPM**.

Dr. Stewart is the Lillian Love Chair in Women's Health at University Health Network and the University of Toronto. She is a University Professor at University of Toronto and is appointed in the Faculty of Medicine in the Departments of Psychiatry, Obstetrics/Gynecology, Medicine, Anesthesia, Family and Community Medicine, and Surgery. She is a Senior Scientist at Toronto General Research Institute and her research interests are in women's health, women's health education, women's mental health, interpersonal violence, psychological aspects of reproductive health, psychological reaction to physical illness and international health.

Dr. Stewart is the recipient of over 100 peer-reviewed scientific research grants and has published over 260 scientific articles in peer-reviewed journals and 5 books. She is an Institutional Advisory Board Member of Canadian Institutes for Health Research Institute of Gender and Health and Deputy Editor of the American Psychiatric Publishing Inc. She is a member of the Editorial Board of Canadian Medical Association Journal and 10 other medical journals. She is immediate Past President of the International Association for Women's Mental Health. Dr. Stewart has made numerous presentations to local, provincial, federal, and international government agencies responsible for developing policy on women's health. She has won numerous awards for research and leadership and was appointed a senior advisor in women's health to the World Health Organization in 2007, and the Visiting Canadian Women Scientist to Japan in 2009, and Professor of Women's Health at King Saud University in Saudi Arabia in 2009-2013.



DLIN/FISCHER AWARD

The Dlin/Fischer Clinical Research Award is presented for significant achievement in clinical research and the best paper submitted for presentation at the annual meeting. The award is named for Barney M. Dlin, MD, FAPM, president of APM 1983-84, and H. Keith Fischer, MD, FAPM, president 1975-76.

Wayne J. Katon, MD, FAPM received the 2010 Dlin/Fischer award. Dr. Katon is Professor of Psychiatry, Director of the Division of Health Services and Epidemi-

RESEARCH AWARD

The APM Research Award is given to honor the accomplishments and stature of a currently active researcher in the field of psychosomatic medicine. This year's award was presented to **Bruce L. Rollman, MD, MPH**.

ology, and Vice Chair of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Washington Medical School. Dr. Katon is internationally renowned for his research on the prevalence of anxiety and depressive disorders in primary care, the relationship of psychiatric disorders to medically unexplained symptoms such as headache and fatigue, and the impact of depression and anxiety on patients with chronic medical illness. In recent years, his research has focused on developing innovative models of integrating mental health professionals and other allied health personnel into primary care to improve the care of patients with major depression and panic disorder.

Dr. Katon has received numerous awards, including APM's Research Award in 1993. He is editor-in-chief of *General Hospital Psychiatry* and is honored by being one of the Web of Science Highly Cited Authors.



Dr. Rollman is Associate Professor of Medicine, Psychiatry, and Clinical and Translational Science at the Center for Research on Health Care, Division of General Internal Medicine, the University of Pittsburgh.

Dr. Rollman's research focuses on interventions to improve the quality of care for depression and anxiety disorders in non-psychiatric settings. He has been principal investigator on several federally-funded projects including the NHLBI-funded "Bypassing the Blues" trial, the first study to examine the impact of collaborative care treatment for depression following CABG surgery. He is also board-certified in Internal Medicine and maintains an active clinical practice. Dr. Rollman is highly experienced with state-of-the-art techniques for dissemination of practice guidelines, the conduct of mental health services research in non-psychiatric settings, and the contemporary practice of medicine.

APM FELLOWSHIPS

Academy fellowship (FAPM) is bestowed on Academy members who have shown active participation as educators, researchers, or administrators in the field of C-L psychiatry/psychosomatic medicine.



BIOETHICS SIG

The APM Bioethics Special Interest Group meets annually to discuss bioethical issues, publishes bioethics discussions in *Psychosomatics*, and develops symposia and round-tables for presentation at APM annual meetings.

We welcome new members and invite you to submit case presentations with complex bioethical issues for consideration for publication, with commentaries, in the new **Issues in Bioethics** section of *Psychosomatics*. This section was proposed in 2005 and was enthusiastically endorsed by former and current editors Dr. Tom Wise and Dr. Ted Stern for publishing once a year or once every two years. An introduction to the new section appeared in the November-December 2006 issue of *Psychosomatics* (47[6]:519), and two cases have been published to-date:

- Jan-Feb 2007 (48[1]:10-14) — DNR vs. DNT clinical implications of a conceptual ambiguity. Includes commentary.
- May-June 2009 (50[3]:185-191, with commentary 192-197) — Distinguishing among irrational suicide and other forms of hastened death: implications for clinical practice.

The third case presentation by Dr. Cindy Geppert and colleagues, along with the commentaries, is currently being reviewed for publication in 2011.

Annual Meeting Symposium

Our 2010 proposal for a Bioethics symposium was not accepted for the Academy's 2010 program, but at our Bioethics SIG meeting last November, the decision was made to resubmit the proposal for the 2011 meeting. The symposium title is "Teaching Bioethics to PM Psychiatrists" and includes these topics:

- a. Defining Bioethical Concepts, Boundaries, and Who Should Do Ethics Consults?
- b. Elopement Risk
- c. Raising Awareness about Bioethics
- d. National Standards for Ethics Consultations - final report

New Study, New Task Force: Efavirenz

A listserv question in November 2010 catalyzed a remarkable online discussion about the neuropsychiatric side effects of efavirenz. Thanks to all the members who participated in the discussion, it led to the formation of a task force for research on the issue and to include the topic in our prospective 2011 symposium.

The goal of the task force is to develop a study of the psychiatric side effects of antiretroviral medications using efavirenz as a paradigm and to inform further research on a national level in collaboration with member Marshall Forstein and the APA Office of HIV Psychiatry. The task force is led by Kelly Cozza with members Andrew Angelino, Sharon Batista, Phil Bialer, Mary Ann Cohen, Oliver Freudenreich, Harold Goforth, John Grimaldi, Suad Kapetanovic, Chris Kogut, and Karen Johnson

HAND Project

Members Andrew Angelino, Sharon Batista, Francine Cournos, Stephen Ferrando, and John Grimaldi are working on a project relating to the recognition and treatment of HIV-associated neurocognitive disorders (HAND). A manuscript is in the planning stages, but the preliminary results of some of the work on HAND were presented at

our 2010 symposium, *Educating Clinicians about HIV-Associated Dementia*. APM members can view the slides from this Symposium 3 in the Members' Corner.

2011 Annual Meeting Presentations

We are proposing a symposium as well as a pre-conference course at the 2011 APM meeting.

The symposium is entitled *An AIDS Psychiatry Update and Neuropsychiatric Aspects of Antiretroviral Therapy*. It will update participants on the impact of newer antiretroviral treatments as well as important aspects of HIV prevention.



Call for Abstracts

Submit for Sessions AND Courses by APRIL 15

APM has expanded its online systems this year to include proposals for 2011 pre-conference courses in addition to abstracts for workshops, symposia, and oral/poster papers. We encourage and welcome your submissions, but **you must act by April 15!** All abstracts must be submitted using our online abstract submission system.

New requirements to meet the standards of ACCME have been adopted by the Medical College of Wisconsin (our CME co-sponsor). These requirements necessitate that all authors and presenters listed on each abstract be required to complete a series of questions and disclose any commercial relationships. Previously, only the submitting author was required to personally comply with this, who then contacted co-authors to determine

any commercial disclosures they may have. Now **everyone** listed on an abstract must do this personally.

Note that there are two separate systems for submitting abstracts for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday sessions (workshops, symposia, and oral/poster papers) and for Wednesday pre-conference courses. Links to these two systems are on the APM home page at www.apm.org.

For **workshops, symposia, and papers**, you need to register with the system first and provide your email address, a password, your name, physical address, and phone numbers. A confirming email message will be sent to you from the system with an attachment providing full instructions on how to submit

an abstract. If you have any problems feel free to contact the office for advice and help.

Have an idea or need for a pre-conference course (but don't necessarily want to present it yourself)?

APM has asked members to provide feedback and input on the subject of pre-conference courses at the annual meeting. The link to this survey, which we hope you will submit (anonymously), has been emailed to all members in the March *Update*. Results of the survey will help us in selecting and offering courses of the most interest and meaning to most attendees.
